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The Council on Aging for Henderson County announced the hiring of Daniel Carey as the organization's Director of Development. The Council on Aging for Henderson County provides and coordinates services that engage, connect, and support adults in our community as we age. It provides the Meals on Wheels program for Henderson County, "Lunch at the Sammy" congregate dining at the Sammy Williams Center, liquid nutrition, caregiver services, senior companions, heat relief, and community resource coordination. Meals on Wheels has grown 20% over the last year and demand for the other services continues to rise as well. The Council on Aging operates from donations, grants, and revenues from its two thrift stores.

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
